



The Apostasy of the Church at the Second Coming of Christ

Description

In the face of apostasy, believers are urged to remain steadfast in their faith and to hold fast to the teachings of Scripture. Jesus encourages His followers, saying, “But the one who endures to the end will be saved” (Matthew 24:13 ESV).
